Principal, Hill Regional Career High School

Rose Coggins is helping pave the road for New Haven youth to develop careers in the sciences. As principal of Hill Regional Career High School, a New Haven magnet school focused on exposing students to career opportunities in the fields of health, business and computer technology, Rose is providing New Haven young people with the tools to access the city's growing biosciences and technology-based economy.

She has built partnerships with the Yale School of Medicine and the Yale School or Nursing as part of the Hill Regional Career High School-Yale University partnership which provides more than 200 high school students with the opportunity to spend over three years in classes, laboratories, and structured internships during the school term. Each year 15 to 20 faculty members and 20 to 25 Medical and Nursing students volunteer to support 8 different courses that are offered for credit at the high school. Rose has also supported the professional development of her science staff, and partnered with Yale to offer tuition-free classes to help keep her teachers on the cutting edge of science education.

Public Servant

He also cared about his co-workers and rose to top positions with Yale University's union leadership.

Raised in the Hill neighborhood, Phil was a mentor and friend to many – he was fair, honest, approachable and effective. He believed in public service whether that meant hammering out municipal bugets in city hall or helping neighbors become part of the community.
